Turkey, its allies struggling, tempers ambitions to lead region

Turkey is rethinking its effort to reshape the region, and is instead reaching out to the Middle East's two Shiite Muslim powers, Iraq and Iran.

The idealism of leading a new Sunni alliance has given way to a more pragmatic approach centered on securing access to oil and gas for its economy, improving conditions for Turkish businesses and finding a way out of the intractable conflict in Syria. Many analysts describe the shift as a return to the mantra of "zero problems" with neighbors, a slogan that had previously guided Turkey's foreign policy under the governing party.

Iraqi Kurdish president in Turkey to back PM's peace effort

The president of Iraqi Kurdistan called on Turkey's Kurds to back a flagging peace process with Ankara on 16 November, making his first visit to southeastern Turkey in two decades in a show of support for Prime Minister Tayyip Erdogan.

Masoud Barzani's trip to Diyarbakir, the main city in Turkey's Kurdish-dominated southeast, comes as Ankara finalizes billions of dollars of energy deals with his semi-autonomous region and amid mutual concern over the ambitions of Kurdish militias in the chaos of neighboring Syria.

Al-Qaeda recruits entering Syria from Turkey safehouses

Hundreds of al-Qaeda recruits are being kept in safe houses in southern Turkey, before being smuggled over the border to wage “jihad” in Syria.

These foreign jihadists have now largely eclipsed the “moderate” wing of the rebel Free Syrian Army, which is supported by the West. Al-Qaeda’s ability to use Turkish territory will raise questions about the role the Nato member is playing in Syria’s civil war.

After more than two years of intense work, Turkey's hopes for a civilian constitution have been declared dead, ready to be buried.

The announcement, coming from various parts of the so-called Conciliation Commission, brings new doubts to the fore about the future of the country's dragging, slow-motion democratization process, for it raises new questions on whether or not there are any options left for a badly needed social contract.

Turkey's Kemalists see secularist legacy under threat

Tension between religious and secular elites has long been one of the underlying fault lines in the predominantly Muslim but constitutionally secular republic, forged from the ruins of an Ottoman theocracy by Ataturk 90 years ago.

But a stream of provocative comments from Erdogan, who is expected to stand for president in elections next year, has heightened accusations of religiously-motivated interference in private life and exacerbated secularists' sense of siege.

**TUSIAD President Muharrem Yılmaz says co-ed housing row inopportune and waste of time**

President of TUSIAD Muharrem Yılmaz has criticized the over-politicization of the debate on mixed-student housing during an interview with Hürriyet, describing it as inopportune and a waste of time. "This inopportune row, which we consider as occupying too much space on [Turkey's political] agenda, carries marks of the 1980 Constitution's features promoting centralization and standardization of the individual," Yılmaz said.

The debate was triggered after Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdoğan expressed his opposition against female and male students living under the same roof, subsequently leading to a public uproar. He also announced that the government was ready to take the necessary legal steps to prevent such accommodation arrangements. Yılmaz said in response that such debates were harming the country's stability by further polarizing society, adding that an individual's right to privacy was constitutionally protected.

**Net \$8.7 bln FDI entered Turkey in first nine months**

Approximately \$8.7 billion of net foreign direct investment (FDI) entered Turkey in the first nine months of the year, according to data released by the Ministry of Economy on Tuesday.

Out of the total FDI of \$8.698 billion in the first nine months, \$3.321 billion entered the economy via operations of intermediary financial institutions, \$1.215 billion came from the electricity, gas and water sector and \$1.187 billion from the manufacturing sector. Also, 60.5 percent of the cash capital came from European Union countries.

**Energy needs trump Turkey-Israel tension**

Turkey and Israel's political divergence in the past few years is of little concern to businessmen, especially when some of the world's largest natural gas deposits are at stake.

Israel, together with Cyprus, sits on more than 120 trillion cubic feet of natural gas in the Eastern Mediterranean, according to U.S. Geological Survey assessments. That's enough to meet natural gas needs for 2,400 years in energy-starved Turkey, which relies on Russia for 60% and Iran for 20% of its imports.
